# THIS Edition's **UPDATE**What is the Graduate Labor Union doing today?

This is our semester! We are part of the wave of graduate labor organizing across the country.

After talking to countless grad workers at the University of Minnesota, we have found that we are overworked and underpaid. Our stipends have decreased in actual purchasing power over the last seven years, while university administrators receive hefty annual raises and million dollar compensation packages. We have no dependable structures to ameliorate abusive workplace environments. We don't enjoy transportation benefits or complete vision or dental insurance. High dependent health insurance costs add an undue burden on those who need that resource. Many of us pay student fees despite generating much of the university's research and educational value. The U unfairly burdens international students, offering insufficient protections while charging an additional fee for the ISSS office. And WE have the power to change that.

In a month, we will be going public with our Union campaign and starting our card campaign. During this process, we will be asking our colleagues to sign a union card. These

cards get sent to the Bureau of Mediation Services (BMS) and that is when we file for a Union election.

### What are the biggest issues you face as a graduate worker at UMN? How do these issues affect your life?

One of the biggest issues I have noticed is a difference in the levels of respect and value afforded to graduate workers compared to what I have experienced in other professional jobs. This includes pay that fails to meet a living wage but also general attitudes toward the work that we do. I have found that compared to previous jobs, this situation makes it harder to stay motivated and complete my work to the high standards I would like to meet.

#### How would unionizing help solve these problems?

Unionizing would mean recognition for the value we provide to the university. We would be able to have a voice in our labor conditions and work together for improvements, including fair and equitable wages across departments.

#### Why do you support the UMN Graduate Labor Union?

I support unionizing because it's the only way to gain collective power as graduate workers. Unionizing is how we fight together for fair and equitable pay and working conditions. It's how we make graduate school a place that's truly open to everyone, not just those privileged to have outside support.

## Labor History SPOTLIGHT



Featured here (courtesy of the Library of Congress) is Mary Harris Jones - famously known as **Mother Jones**. A victim of the Irish Famine and the Chicago Fire, as well as a yellow fever epidemic that led to the loss of her husband and all their children, Mother Jones became an activist and labor organizer, particularly associated with coal miners and children. Mother Jones became involved in the Chicago labor scene in the late 19th century, led the 1903 March of the Mill Children, and was a

co-founder of International Workers of the World in 1905. The IWW occupies a complex and significant place in <u>labor history</u> and it continues today. In addition to its various work, the IWW compiled a songbook; <u>HathiTrust has the 1910 version of the IWW Song Book</u> (<u>Little Red Songbook</u>)
